TEN SHARED PRINCIPLES



WHEREAS, on March 22, 2018, the NAACP Illinois State Conference and the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police agreed to 10 Shared Principles designed to build trust between law enforcement and communities of color, and

WHEREAS, the two statewide associations vowed “by mutual affirmations to work together and stand together in our communities and at the state level to implement these values and principles, and to replace mistrust with mutual trust wherever, whenever, and however we can.”

NOW BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Bradley, Illinois, Police Department adopts these same Ten Shared Principles as their own, and thereby adds its name to the historic agreement between the NAACP and the ILACP. These are the Ten Shared Principles:

1. We value the life of every person and consider life to be the highest value.
2. All persons should be treated with dignity and respect. This is another foundational value.
3. We reject discrimination toward any person that is based on race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability, or familial status.
4. We endorse the six pillars in the report of the President’s Task Force on 21st Century Policing. The first pillar is to build and rebuild trust through procedural justice, transparency, accountability, and honest recognition of past and present obstacles.
5. We endorse the four pillars of procedural justice, which are fairness, voice (i.e., an opportunity for citizens and police to believe they are heard), transparency, and impartiality.
6. We endorse the values inherent in community policing, which includes community partnerships involving law enforcement, engagement of police officers with residents outside of interaction specific to enforcement of laws, and problem-solving that is collaborative, not one-sided.
7. We believe that developing strong ongoing relationships between law enforcement and communities of color at the leadership level and street level will be the keys to diminishing and eliminating racial tension.
8. We believe that law enforcement and community leaders have a mutual responsibility to encourage all citizens to gain a better understanding and knowledge of the law to assist them in their interactions with law enforcement officers.
9. We support diversity in police departments and in the law enforcement profession. Law enforcement and communities have a mutual responsibility and should work together to make a concerted effort to recruit diverse police departments.
10. We believe de-escalation training should be required to ensure the safety of community members and officers. We endorse using de-escalation tactics to reduce the potential for confrontations that endanger law enforcement officers and community members; and the principle that human life should be taken only as a last resort.

Loyalty – Because our loyalty stands with all mankind, the constitution and with each other we will always deliver our best with the largest level of Integrity and Professionalism to safeguard lives and property, to protect the innocent and the weak, and to act as a barrier against violence and disorder.

Obligation – We recognize that our Badge is a symbol of public faith thus our obligation is to the community we serve. We will continuously try to improve our relations to strengthen public trust and mutual respect, while being mindful to those in need, aiding with even the slightest of calls, respecting all courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will.

Responsible – We believe in liberty, equality and justice for all. Therefore, will continue to maintain a professional image, be ethical in our actions, compassionate in our dealings, and treat all with fairness, dignity, and respect no matter race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability or familial status.

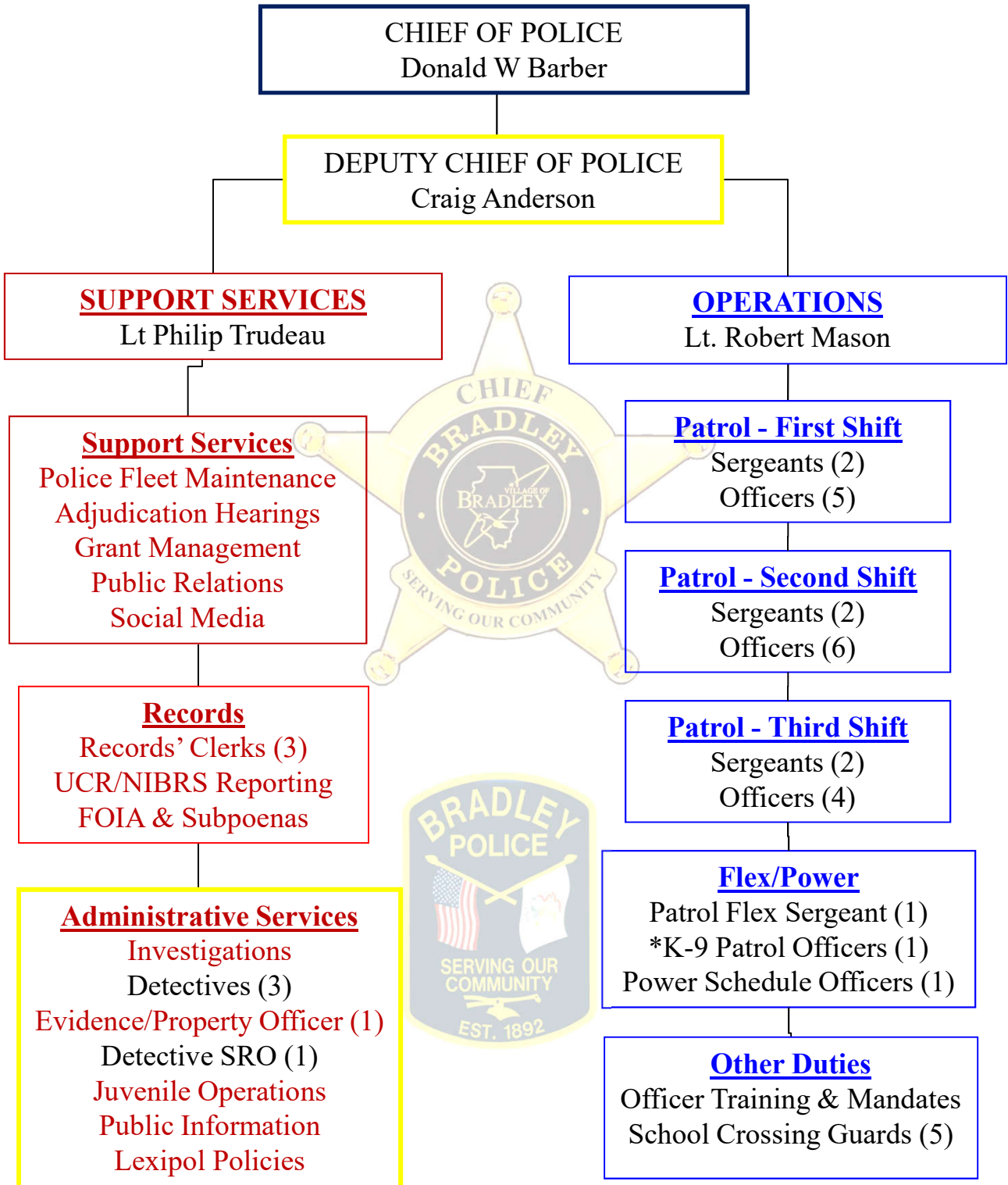

The Deputy Chief works in concert with the Support & Operations Divisions by providing essential services behind the scenes and overall supervision of day to day operations.

The Deputy Chief is assigned to Investigate all Internal Affairs and/or Complaints against Department Personnel. His Office is also the Primary Contact for Freedom of Information Requests, Nuisance Abatement and maintains the Department's Lexipol Policy Manual along with assisting with Village Technology Issues.

Deputy Chief Craig Anderson has over 20 of Service with the Bradley Police Department. During those years he has served as School Resource Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Shift Commander, Operations & Support Services Commander prior to his current assignment. D.C. Anderson has also served as Executive Officer of ILEAS Region 3 South, Bradley Honor Guard Commander and is a Veteran of the US Army.

2020 COMPLAINTS & INTERNAL AFFAIRS

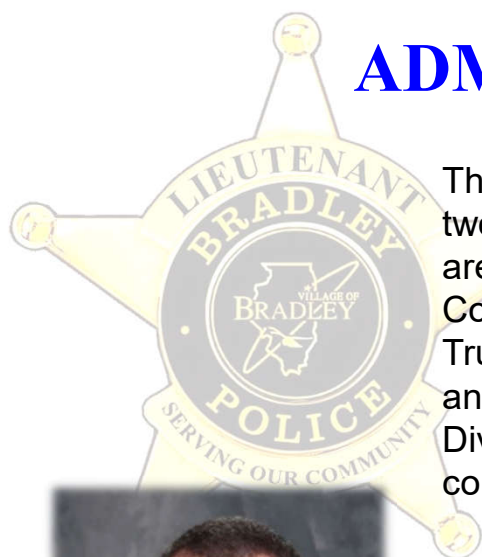
During 2020, the Department received and investigated four formal complaints against personnel. Of these complaints one complaint was unfounded, two complaints were founded with minor policy violations, one complaint was founded with an equipment policy violation. The department occasionally receives inquiries about an employee's actions and are usually mitigated or resolved at the Supervisory or Command level. The department does receive numerous compliments about personnel via email, social media, letters, cards and in person.

Police Pursuits and Bradley Police Officers initiated 10 vehicle pursuits in 2020. Of these pursuits all were found compliant with department policy. Five of the pursuits were terminated by the Officer and/or Supervisor and there were Six Arrests made on drivers involved for various offenses (traffic, theft, burglary, robbery) after the pursuit or subsequent to an investigation.

The Operations Division of the Bradley Police Department consists of one Commander, 7 Sergeants and 17 Patrol Officers which includes 1 K9 Officers. The Operations Division is the backbone of the Bradley Police Department and is most recognized as the Patrol Unit. Its primary responsibilities include: The protection of life and property, the preservation of peace and order, the control and direction of traffic, the investigation of traffic crashes, the investigations of criminal acts in progress and the apprehension of criminals and the provisions of a myriad of other police services. Lt Mason also oversees Officer Training and Range.

The Support Services Division of the Bradley Police Department consists of one Commander who helps The Deputy Chief oversee Investigations: 3 Detectives; Property & Evidence: 1 Evidence Officer, and a School Resource Officer. The Support Services Division primarily manages the Records Units and Reporting Systems. In addition Lt Trudeau helps manage the Police Fleet and Seeks, Applies and Manages State and Federal Grants for the Police Department. In 2020 the Role of PPE coordinator was adopted by this Division as well.

RECORDS DIVISION

The purpose of the Police Records Division is to keep track of the crime reports, traffic collision reports and citations that the officers generate. The Records Division has various responsibilities critical to the proper functioning of the police department. They perform departmental law enforcement record keeping, input of computer data and general clerical support duties, such as:

- **Processing of police reports, providing information to the Kankakee County State's Attorney, Courts and Juvenile Probation**
- **Locate and copy police records for individuals, private attorneys, county agencies, insurance companies and FOIA Requests**
- **Research records to assist other law enforcement agencies conducting background investigations and process subpoena requests**
- **Maintain, control and purge police records**
- **Input computer information concerning traffic citations and crash reports**
- **Process and collect fines for parking and ordinance citations**
- **Compile crime statistics for city, state and federal agencies**
- **Assist the general public at the counter and over the phone**

Records Clerks for the Village of Bradley Police Department also specialize in certain aspects of the Records division along with their daily duties.

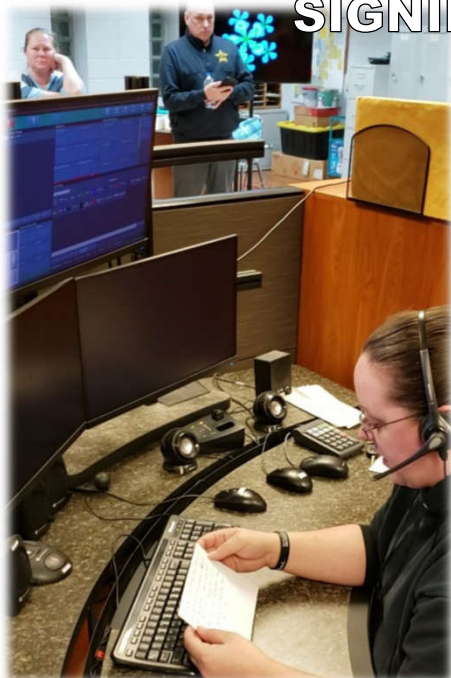

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION UNIT



The Criminal Investigations Unit is composed of three full-time detectives who have the responsibility of investigating felony and misdemeanor, person and property crimes. The Unit's Detectives will Rotate with Assignments and also includes the KAMEG Officer and currently the SRO.

The detectives assigned to the criminal investigation unit are specially trained in one or more of the following areas: crime scene processing, forensic evidence, sexual assaults, crimes against children and elderly and homicide investigation. At a major crime scene their function is primarily to collect all evidence, conduct interviews and interrogations to focus on developing a suspect. At each major crime scene one of the detectives is assigned as Lead Investigator. They are responsible for assessing all information received and collected, they may also assign duties to other team members. The Lead Investigator's role is rotated among those qualified to ensure they stay fresh and have equal opportunity to utilize their training and develop their investigative skills.

PROPERTY & EVIDENCE

Evidence Officer Matthew Baxter is a certified Crime Scene Investigator and is the primary on-call Crime Scene Technician for the Bradley Police Department. Evidence Officer Baxter oversees the other Bradley Police Department Crime Scene Technicians, along with the maintenance and inventory of evidence equipment and supplies. The daily function of Evidence Officer Baxter is the entry of evidence into the New World Reporting System, along with the submission of evidence to the Illinois State Police Crime Lab.



There are over 25000 Items being held in the Bradley Police Evidence Rooms and Vaults. Many of these Items we cannot dispose of and must be safely kept indefinitely. **There were over 1400 items entered into Evidence in 2020.**



Between March and May 2020 Evidence Officer Baxter, with the assistance of Officer Dersien, Officer LeBeau, and Officer Pietraszewski inventoried and bar coded the evidence retained at the Bradley Police Dept. This update brings the Bradley Police Department Evidence Vaults in line with the current technology used by the New World System. In addition to this update, 278 items of property were returned, donated, and destroyed in 2020.

Officer Baxter is also a certified **A.L.I.C.E.**™ Instructor, and trained area school personnel and church leaders in active violence response and emergency preparedness. This commitment by the Bradley Police Department is imperative in keeping our school children and community safe by staying proactive.



Officer James Knapp has been the BBCHS SRO since 2016 and is assigned to be present at all on-site school activities (which were mostly cancelled due to the Covid-19 Pandemic) along with conducting safety checks on the school building and it's visitors throughout the school year. It was definitely an odd year for the SRO and Ofc Knapp's experience was a welcomed asset to see it through.

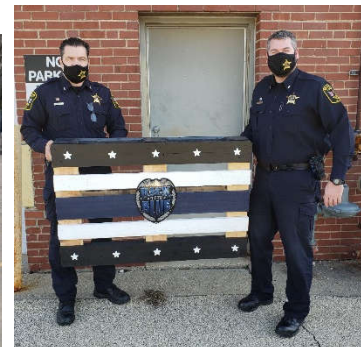

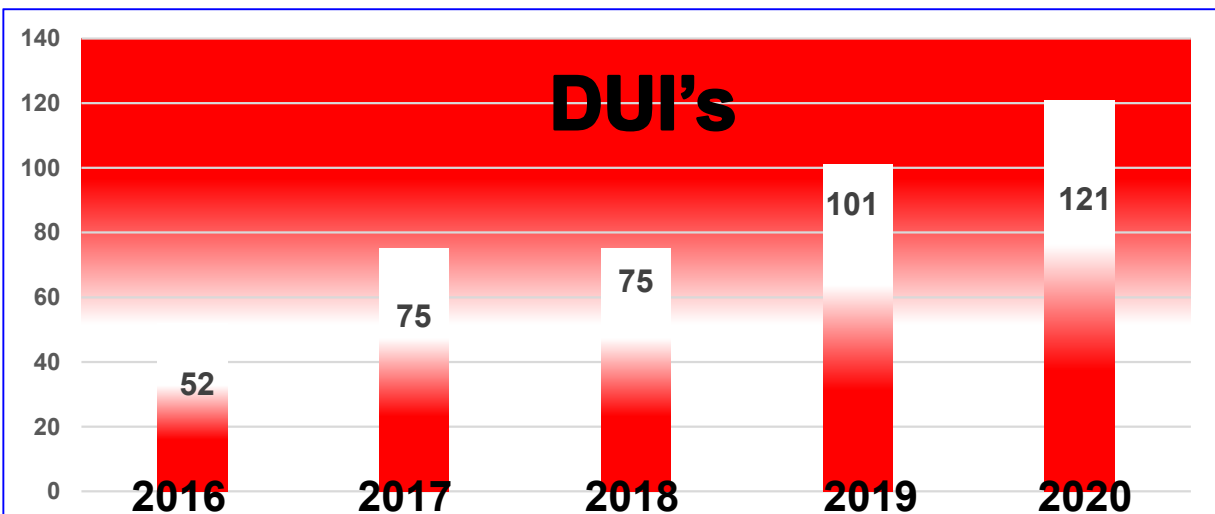
